Polítical Advocacy

As Political Advocacy Rep for our district, I am sometimes asked by politicians and other groups about the issues that are priorities and concerns for our members. I usually respond that health care issues are a major concern for our group and, when we start talking about these matters, we often don't get on to other topics because there seems to be so much to talk about in the area of health care. I am certain, though, that we have lots of concerns in other areas. I know when I wrote about the situation concerning Canada Post that this issue struck a chord with many of our members who phoned, wrote, and emailed me their agreement. Many other groups, including CARP, a number of charities, and the Canadian Federation of Independent Businesses, are also angered by the Crown Corporation's plans. Only one of our members told me that he thought the government's approach was correct. Also, recently, our executive decided to nominate "The Canine Companion for Veterans Program" as our suggestion for our annual provincial charity and it became quite clear that our executive members care very

deeply about our veterans and are troubled about their treatment by our federal government. Further, a number of our members have expressed some worries about the proposed Federal Fair Vote Bill. Voting in elections has always been very sacred to our members and our group ranks high among the population that takes the time and makes the effort to vote in elections at all levels of government. What else are you concerned about?

I recently saw an excellent email from the Chamber of Commerce asking its members for feedback on issues that they felt were important to raise during the municipal election. I thought that this was a very good idea and that we too would like to get a sense of our priorities and concerns from retired seniors' points of view as we move toward provincial and federal elections. What issues do you care about? What issues should be raised and discussed during the election campaigns? Phone calls are okay but I am often out during the day - especially now, too, that the weather is finally improving! I prefer emails and letters because I can respond when I have time and without disturbing people – especially if it's late at night or early in the morning.

Remember RTO/ERO is non-partisan and does not endorse any candidate or party but works to help its members become more informed on issues so they can take an even more active role in the democratic process. RTO/ ERO also tries to express the concerns and views of our members to politicians and other community groups. It is important that we know what issues are important to you.

A few quick follow-ups :

- Starting April 12, 2014, drivers aged 80 and over will no longer have to complete a written knowledge test. Instead, they will participate in a shorter, simpler renewal program that includes a vision test, a driver record review, an improved in-class group education session and two short, in-class screening exercises. The new renewal session will take approximately 90 minutes, or less than half the time of the current program. The current cost of renewal for seniors will remain the same at \$32. There is no additional cost for a road test if needed.
- The Yorklands Green Hub, which I wrote about in our last newsletter, was one of the top 15 ideas of

Guelph's Elevator Project and received the most votes from citizens who voted on the 51 ideas chosen that would improve the lives of Guelph citizens. This project which is really gaining momentum in terms of support will also enhance the lives of citizens in Wellington County.

• The Ministry of Consumer Services recently launched a very helpful website: <u>www.ontario.ca/consumerprotection</u> where citizens can get vital information about a range of consumer topics, such as home renovations, travel, joining a fitness club, door-to-door sales and gift cards.

As always, there are so many issues and so little space! I would like to hear from you so that we can focus on the issues that matter to you.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. I'm turning 65 this year, so I'll be eligible for the provincial drug program. Do I need to maintain my Extended Care Coverage?

Yes. While the ODB provides coverage for certain drugs, more than half of the drugs available in the Canadian market today are not covered by ODB. In addition, the RTO/ERO EHC Plan covers much more than prescription drugs. For example: vision care, 15 different paramedical practitioners, private duty nursing, and travel coverage (including trip cancellation and interruption/delay). If you travel, the cost of medical insurance for a couple, over 70 yrs., for 62 days is very expensive.

Furthermore, there are an increasing number of drugs that are considered "Limited Use" and are only covered by the ODB Program if specific criteria are met. These specific criteria, as well as the list of approved "Limited Use" drugs, change throughout the year. Johnson Inc. requires a doctor's note each year confirming that you do not meet the ODB eligibility criteria. You then may become eligible to have this drug covered under your EHC Plan.

Some additional items covered: Ambulance 80%, ODB fee of \$100 – 85% covered, Glasses - \$325 every two years, Eye Exams - \$90, Orthotics - \$500, yearly hearing test to a limit of \$75, and accidental dental up to \$1,000 per incident. Read about your enhanced benefits in your 2014 Insurance Plan Booklet pp. 12-22.

2. Can I purchase glasses, hearing aids, etc. in another country and submit the receipt for reimbursement?

Purchases can be made outside Canada; however, reimbursement would be made as if the expense was incurred in your own province of residence subject to the RTO/ERO Plan's maximums and limitations. All reimbursements are made in Canadian funds.

3. What is a generic drug?

In order for a generic drug to get its Rx number, the maker of the generic drug must demonstrate that the drug has the same active ingredient and that the identical strength, dosage form, route of administration and labeling as the brand-name drug. The company must also demonstrate that people absorb the drug at the same rate. "People may think that brand-name products are better because they are more expensive, but the body does not know whether the drug came from a brand-name or a generic company," said Dr. Vinod P. Shad, a pharmaceutical scientist of 30 years. Generic medications are here to stay. I find it confusing that some generic meds manufactured by the same company sell for different prices at popular pharmacies. You would think the government would step up and regulate generic drug prices.

Consumers tend to reap big savings when a drug pat-

ent expires, freeing other companies to sell generic equivalents. Worldwide patents are usually for 20 years; however, 4 years ago, our Federal government gave a 5-year extension to certain European Drug companies who sell their products in Canada so that generic equivalents could not be manufactured here at a lower price. As this extension is coming to the end, possibly lower-priced generic drugs may hit the market. If you are on ODB, you know all about generic equivalents.
